c. The purpose of Inspiration

The purpose of Inspiration now appears to have been threefold:

- (1) To <u>move</u> holy men of God to set down such events and such interpretation of events in the history of revelation as God wished recorded
- (2) To <u>guide</u> the writers of Scripture to select such events and such interpretation of events in the history of revelation as God wished to be included in Scripture
- (3) To <u>preserve</u> the writers of Scripture from error in the Inscripturation of such events and such interpretation of events in the history of revelation as God wished inscripturated
- (1) To <u>move</u> holy men of God to set down such events and such interpretation of events in the history of revelation as God wished recorded
 - II Peter 1:21 states: "For not by the will of man came prophecy at any time, but being borne up by the Holy Spirit, men spoke from God."
 - The initial impulse to write Scripture did not originate in the will of man, but in the will of God.
- (2) To <u>guide</u> the writers of Scripture to select such events and such interpretation of events in the history of revelation as God wished to be included in Scripture
 - Again, II Peter 1:21 states: "being borne up (or carried along) by the Holy Spirit, men spoke from God."
 - The guidance needed to select events and meanings came from the Spirit of God.
- (3) To <u>preserve</u> the writers of Scripture from error in the interpretation of such events and such interpretation of events in the history of revelation as God wished inscripturated.
