According to the proposals made in these writings, the genealogies of Genesis 5 and 11 are not lists of successive generations framed in a chronological scheme, but the records of lines of descent, with no indication of the length of time between individuals in these lines. Thus "son of" means descendant of, and "father of" means ancestor of. There could have been 1,000 years or 10,000 years or 100,000 years between individuals. The question of man's antiquity is therefore a scientific, not a biblical question.
