I. First of all, then, what elements are <u>traditionally</u> associated with the meaning of Christmas?

Traditional elements may be classified into those that are primarily secular, and those that are primarily religious.

- A. Traditional <u>Secular</u> Elements consist of traditional symbols and traditional actions.
  - 1. Traditional symbols include:
    - a. Santa Claus (or Saint Nicholas, or Senta Klaas, or Kris Kringle)
    - b. The Christmas Tree (or the Tannenbaum)
    - c. colored lights
    - d. holly
    - e. mistletoe
    - f. candles
    - g. the Yule log
    - h. bells
    - 1. candy canes
    - j. the colors red and green
    - k. toys
    - snow (in temperate climates)
    - m. Christmas songs

All these are traditional secular <u>symbols</u> associated with Christmas. But there are also traditional secular <u>actions</u> associated with the observance of Christmas.

- Traditional secular actions include:
  - a. the exchanging of gifts
  - b. the sending of greetings, usually through cards
  - c. the gathering of families
  - d. the Christmas feast
  - e. the visiting of relatives and friends
  - f. the giving of something to the poor and needy
  - g. Christmas shopping

Besides these traditional <u>secular</u> elements, there are also traditional <u>religious</u> elements associated with the observance of Christmas.

- B. These Traditional Religious Elements include:
  - 1. The Christmas Story
  - 2. Christmas carols
  - special musical programs
  - 4. special church services
  - nativity scenes (or creches)

All of these are elements that have <u>traditionally</u> been associated with Christmas.
